
EXAMPLES OF PROPOSED IDEAS-
A. Develop additional training and outreach for lenders, insurers, and non-technical individuals.
B. Document current status of Trinity Trail System Components and map existing facilities and proposed projects. Explore opportunities for connection and overall cooperation in implementing proposed segments and facilities.
C. Host meeting of participating local governments with Texas Parks and Wildlife, Natural Resources Conservation Service, USACE, Texas Trails Network, etc. to discuss needs, priorities and opportunities for floodplain, riparian, habitat, and related open space resource management needs.
D. Develop strategy for use of Corridor Development Certificate (CDC)/Integrated Stormwater Management (iSWM) in critical watersheds having a significant impact on the Trinity River Corridor.
E. East Fork of the Trinity River Outreach and strategic development based on Dallas County interests and surrounding communities.
F. Development of tools to compare CDC Model data over a span of time.
G. Development of a summary report or collection of data from May 2015 weather events.
H. Develop resources to provide assistance to Common Vision communities participating in the Community Rating System program.
I. Creation of promotional materials and updates related to CDC Program, which could include a newsletter created and distributed by NCTCOG Staff detailing Corridor floodplain activities, initiatives, and CDC permit updates.
J. Continue the development of online CDC tools with an online application site which will be used to receive and track applications.

The Trinity River COMMON VISION Program

INTRODUCTION: The Trinity River COMMON VISION Program continues to focus on the goals outlined in the Regional Policy Position on Trinity River Corridor – 1989 and the commitment expressed in Interlocal Agreements among the participating communities. Toward the continued goal of maintaining this important cooperative program among the COMMON VISION communities, NCTCOG is proposing a work program of the following ongoing support and technical components.

We propose to maintain the program at a \$100,000 level of support, continuing the cost breakout among the participants as per the previous traditional method based on SPF 1995 Baseline.

SUMMARY OF FY 2016 PROGRAM ELEMENTS

Ongoing support activities:

- **Ongoing Trinity River COMMON VISION Information and Task Force Committee Support:** Continued service and support of the Trinity River Program committees (Common Vision Steering Committee and Flood Management Task Force), as well as distribution of important general Corridor information to the public and to regional delegates at the State and Federal levels.
- **Ongoing Corridor Development Certificate (CDC) Process and mapping support:** Administrative support of the CDC process, technical/procedural assistance to local government participants, coordination with US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) staff and addressing inquiries from interested individuals.
- **Continued sponsorship of FEMA's NFIP training courses:** Continuation of the long-running partnership with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Region 6 for important training opportunities to be offered in the region for the benefit of the FMTF and other floodplain management officials. The very popular "Managing Floodplain Development through the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP)" course will be offered, marking the 19th year that this week long class will be offered at NCTCOG. The class is offered in partnership with the Texas Floodplain Manager's Association (TFMA) who will offer testing for students to become Certified Floodplain Managers.
- **Continued effort toward a Consolidated CDC Model:** Continued collaboration and support activities associated with the georeferencing, creation, and maintenance of a FEMA/USACE Consolidated H&H Model.
- **Ongoing effort to explore partnership and outreach opportunities:** Continued efforts to partner with agencies including the US Army Corps of Engineers Fort Worth District (USACE-FWD), FEMA, and TFMA for traditional projects or educational opportunities.
- **Continued exploration of regional cooperative detention/retention strategies:** Discussion and investigation of potential strategies will continue on key critical watersheds and segments throughout the Trinity Basin. Continue to research and collect information on existing management approaches in those areas.
